

ABOUT THE MAJOR

A degree in English Education can lead to a rewarding and socially fulfilling career. Teachers of English shape their students’ critical thinking and writing skills while also performing the important civic duties of broadening students’ understanding of human culture and history. Teachers also enjoy stable employment opportunities that provide greater work/life balance than many other fields of employment. If you love literature, poetry, film, storytelling, history, philosophy, religion, and other studies in the humanities and would like to share that love with others, the English Education program might be just what you are looking for.

Students interested in jumpstarting their career progress may apply for the ABM (Accelerated Bachelor to Master) program, which allows students to count six credit hours of graduate level coursework towards their B.A. degree; these credit hours will also count towards the M.A. degree, reducing the time it takes to earn both degrees. Students will apply for the program in their junior year and must have a G.P.A. of 3.5. Students must have completed ENGL 3000 prior to starting their ABM coursework; students are also advised to have completed one 4000-level literary history course prior to beginning their graduate level course substitutions.
